"The Retainer Box Thanksgiving"

This past week, as I was preparing for my weekly golf retreat, I took out a wind jacket to wear before heading to the course. This jacket happens to be one of my most cherished pieces of golf attire because it's made of an expensive waterproof fabric called Gore-Tex. Jackets like this are usually beyond my budget since they're among the best of their kind—and also the most expensive. But God was gracious to me and provided an opportunity many years ago to

purchase this jacket at a bargain price I could actually afford when it went on sale at an online golf store.

Over the years, the jacket's water repellency began to wear off, and it needed some "reconditioning," which required washing it with a special chemical meant to "renew" its waterproof quality. This past week was the first time I tried wearing it after that reconditioning. For some reason, though, I couldn't zip it up. After several failed attempts, I gave up in frustration and decided to investigate the

I brought out another jacket to compare the zipper mechanisms and better understand what was going wrong. That's when I discovered something fascinating: my favorite jacket wouldn't zip up because the *retainer box*—the small piece at the bottom of the zipper—was missing. I even had to look it up online to learn its name for the first time!

The retainer box, also known as a *pin box* or *starter box*, locks the two sides of the zipper together at the bottom, providing a secure starting point for the slider to move upward, engaging the teeth and closing the zipper. It's attached at the very bottom of the zipper, and most people probably never even notice it exists. But when that small, almost invisible part detached—likely during the washing process—this expensive, high-end Gore-Tex jacket became completely useless. Everything that made the jacket great—its design, fabric, function, and even its prestige—suddenly didn't matter anymore, all because of one tiny missing piece.

As we enter the season of Thanksgiving, my hope is that we take a moment to recognize and appreciate the "retainer boxes" in our lives—the things and people who rarely get recognition because they often go unnoticed and are taken for granted. We might consider them insignificant or easily overlooked because other things seem more important or deserving of attention. Sometimes they're the tasks we quietly despise, the people we underestimate (or even despise), or the experiences we'd rather ignore. We may not say it out loud, but deep down, we often devalue them.

Yet the truth is, these "small" things and people are indispensable to our well-being, success, and happiness. Let us remember this Thanksgiving that even the finest Gore-Tex jacket is worthless without that tiny retainer box at the bottom of the zipper.

Meet Louise Woodcox



Louise was born in Trenton, New Jersey to a father of Hungarian descent and a mother of Italian descent. She and her family, including younger brother Jack, lived in Central Jersey where her father worked on a farm that supplied tomatoes for Campbell's Soup. He also ran a family farm and became a machinist during WWII, a career maintained alongside farming until retirement.

Good food was a part of Louise's childhood, from fresh produce and Italian dishes like her mom's homemade ravioli to Hungarian specialties like chicken paprikash served with nokedli, noodles similar to German spaetzle. Her favorite comfort food even today is pastina made with oil, garlic, and shredded egg.

Louise and her family settled in the Caldwell area in 1948. Extended family members who had previously moved to the area recommended they attend what was then called the Episcopal Methodist Church (later renamed Caldwell United Methodist Church), praising Pastor Guyn in particular. By 1952, the family had purchased a home and property in Caldwell Township (now Fairfield) where they owned and operated their own seven-acre farm raising pansies, tomatoes, corn, pumpkins, and various other vegetables. Produce and flowers were sold wholesale as well as at the family farmstand.

Jeff and Louise met on a blind date in 1975 and wed in 1977, the bride in her mother's wedding gown. She and Jeff built a home next to her family home, where Louise still resides. In 1995, Louise's father's health began to fail, so she and Jeff took on the main responsibility of running the farm. Jeff suffered a heart attack in 2012 and younger brother Jack died in 2013. At this point, Louise was in her seventies and decided it was time to stop farming. She still loves nature and gardening, however, and plants flowers and a few vegetables in her yard every year. One of her current goals is to cultivate more perennials.

Louise grew up with a great appreciation for music. She was a talented accordion player, having taken lessons starting at age six. She also loved to dance tap and ballet as a child, a passion that later led to ballroom dancing, a favorite pastime of her parents. Jeff and Louise loved to dance together and collected a good number of trophies in amateur ballroom dancing contests. Their favorites? Swing, rumba, and tango.

In addition to work on the farm, Louise cut and styled hair as a certified hairdresser in several salons throughout the 1970s and 80s. She also worked as a secretary at Sandoz, now known as Novartis. Her last job as secretary was with the Salvation Army. This was her favorite because she found people in the faith-based organization to be kind and caring. Louise had always dabbled with painting as a girl. She found the smell of paints, brushes, and turpentine intriguing. What you may not know, however, is that she didn't take a formal art class until age 35. She quickly developed into a talented artist who enjoys working with oils and pastels en plein air (in the open air) as well as in her indoor studio. Some of you may even have taken art lessons with Louise in her studio.

In terms of faith, Louise feels blessed to have found her spiritual home. She feels she is just where she wants to be, in the company of a loving church family. She appreciates Sunday mornings with music, worship, and coffee hour, and pitching in as a volunteer. As a child, Louise regularly played accordion for men's fellowship events. In her adult years, Louise served as Fall Festival Coordinator, Director of dramatic Maundy Thursday reenactments and Fellowship Chair. If Louise could dine with any biblical character, she'd choose Judas to ask why he betrayed Jesus. Favorite hymns include *Amazing Grace* and *Because He Lives*. Favorite scripture includes the 23rd Psalm and 1 Corinthians 13: 4-13. Louise hopes to continue to grow in her faith.
